Regional Services:

Regional Emergency Services Coordinator: Assists the towns and villages in training, equipment coordination and fire prevention and investigation.

Economic Development: Provides programs and services to the citizens and businesses of the region focusing on sustainability and community development.

Fire: Owns 50% of seven fire trucks in eight towns and villages, owns five Wildland trucks for fire suppression use, owns three water tankers for the region, contributed \$214,411 towards operating expenses for town and village fire departments.

Rescue: Contributed 62.22%, \$11,323, of the operating costs for rescue services.
