Winter Roadway Maintenance

Roadways are cleared of snow as necessary. During normal winter conditions, collector and local roads should be cleared of snow within four days and arterial roads should be cleared of snow within one to two days of a snow event, unless there is heavy snow and persistent winds.

Upon request, a field access road may be plowed, one time only, to permit access to: grain bins, re-locate livestock, and/or oil/gas lease sites.

In each maintenance area, three routes are established. When snow plowing is required, the starting point is rotated between routes to ensure that an equitable level of service is provided.

If reduced visibility becomes a safety concern, snow plowing operations will be suspended until conditions improve.

Please keep in mind that our crews will be out

working on our roadways and to use extreme caution while

travelling on these roads while they are being maintained in any way. Thank you.

Snow removal from municipal roadways is not permitted without first obtaining permission from Public Works.

To keep our roadways safe this winter, please refrain from depositing snow and ice from residential laneways onto roadways, right-of-ways and municipal ditches.

Depositing snow and ice onto property other than your own can have the following adverse results:

- Slowing down Flagstaff County's snow removal process;
- Damage to roads and road maintenance equipment;
- Blocking or damaging culverts, which can lead to flooding issues in the spring;
- Damage to utility lines and roadside vegetation;
- Increasing safety hazards for motorists;
 - Damage to snow plow blades.

Private Laneway Maintenance Available

Flagstaff County offers laneway snowplowing and grading to rural residents.

The landowner is required to sign a Private Laneway Service Agreement. County staff is required to conduct an Occupational Health and Safety Inspection/Hazard

Assessment prior to any work being completed, and this process must be completed on an annual basis.

Please note that the inspection/assessment must be conducted prior to a heavy snow accumulation that prevents it from taking place.

The inspection/assessment fee is \$149.

Service to the residents will be conducted only after all scheduled road maintenance is completed on gravel, oil and paved roads. A fee of \$87 per half hour or \$174 per hour will be charged.

Winter Maintenance in Hamlets

During normal winter conditions, streets will be cleared of snow within one to two days of a snow event, unless there is heavy snow and persistent wind. Snow clearing priorities are:

- Main streets in and out of the hamlets;
- Long-term care centre (Galahad) access;

- · Fire hall access;
- Residential streets.

Snow clearing

of lanes and alleys is low priority and will be completed after all streets have been cleared of snow.

Winter Maintenance at Regional Airport



During normal winter conditions, the tarmac will be cleared of snow within one to two days of a snow event, unless there is heavy snow and persistent winds. Clearing of snow will be prioritized as follows:

- Access to the airport;
- Runway and apron;
- Taxiways to the fuel pumps and terminal building:
- Taxiways to the hangars.

Mulching Conducted throughout Winter

Every year, locations are identified throughout the County where trees and brush are overgrown and affecting sightlines adjacent to road allowances. These issues are effectively dealt with by mulching.

Mulching is a method of removing trees and chipping the brush into small pieces. It is both environmentally friendly and visually appealing. Once the grass begins to grow, it camouflages the mulch on the ground. Mulching

> is done in the winter when the trees are frozen, as it allows the mulcher to work more efficiently.

This service is provided to landowners upon request, as crews and equipment are available. Please slow down and drive with extra caution when approaching any

Public Works equipment.





Galahad Raw Water Line Upgrade

This past spring, approximately 1,800 meters of the raw waterline to the Hamlet of Galahad was upgraded.

The waterline runs between the wells, which are located approximately 3 km to the north of the water treatment plant in Galahad, and transports all the water from the wells to the water treatment facility.

The original two-inch waterline was installed in the early 1960s and in the 1980s a portion of

the line, approximately 1,200 meters, was upgraded to a four-inch line to increase the volume of water supplied to the hamlet.

Water supply

Upgrading the remainder of this waterline supports water supply for fire services, residential services, commercial services, and other water requirements, which include the Care Centre, regional fire department and local agricultural water demands.

Infrastructure Responsibility in Hamlets

All water and wastewater infrastructure located on the resident's side of the property

line is the responsibility of the resident to maintain and replace if necessary.

Please ensure water and wastewater infrastructure, such as water meters, are properly insulated and protected

from environmental factors. Residents will be responsible for the cost of any repair or replacement of infrastructure on the resident's side of the property line.

Apply for 2024 Shelterbelt Program

As part of the annual Shelterbelt Establishment Program, Flagstaff County provides trees to rural landowners to help promote, establish, and maintain healthy shelterbelts.

Shelterbelts conserve soil, protect crops and yard sites, trap snow, provide wildlife habitat, and beautify the landscape, among other benefits.

The program is delivered through an



application process and at a 50/50 cost share between Flagstaff County and the landowner for the price of the trees.

Plastic mulch is also available at cost.

Roadside Vegetation Management

Flagstaff County's Ag Services Department controls weed and brush on municipally owned roadsides with herbicide. Roadsides will be sprayed up to 500 feet from a farm site and continue 500 feet past the farm site.

Landowners/tenants that are not in favour of having municipally owned roadsides adjacent to their property treated with herbicide are encouraged to apply for a No Herbicide Agreement prior to June 1.

The No Spray Agreement is good for five years. Please keep in mind that by signing the agreement, you are responsible for maintaining the weed and brush along those areas to municipal standards.

Provincial Highway Spraying

In 2023, Flagstaff County entered into a Municipal Access and Work Agreement with Alberta Transportation to perform roadside spraying along all provincial highways within Flagstaff County where noxious weeds are present.

Roadside Haying

Flagstaff County uses a permit system for all landowners within the county wanting to hay municipal right-of-ways. All roads are intended to be mowed twice a year commencing June 1. The purpose of the permit system is to minimize conflict between the municipality and landowners who want to cut and bale hay along roadsides. The deadline to apply for Roadside Haying Permits is May 15. All permits are only valid for one year. Annual renewal is required.

Tax payments due October 16

2023 Tax and Assessment Notices were mailed to Flagstaff County, Strome and Galahad property owners May 31, 2023.

Payment is due October 16, 2023. A penalty of 12% will be levied on all unpaid taxes after October 16, 2023. To avoid penalties, payments made by mail must be postmarked no later than October 16, and payments made by Internet Banking or TelPay must be received no later than October 16.
